Full operationalization of the Santiago network: Advancing a critical pillar of the loss and damage architecture

25 June 2025 from 12:00 to 13:30 CEST in Room Addis Abeba

Context

The Santiago network was established in 2019 under the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage (WIM) to catalyse technical assistance of diverse organizations, bodies, networks and experts (OBNEs) for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage, in developing countries. Technical assistance is designed to be delivered in a demand-driven manner at the local, national and regional levels, and developed through an inclusive and country-driven process, considering the needs of vulnerable people, Indigenous Peoples and local communities.

Since its establishment, the Santiago network has made considerable progress, including the Advisory Board approval of all operative guidelines. These achievements position 2025 as a pivotal year for the Santiago network, as it transitions from its foundational phase to becoming fully operational. This shift signals a breakthrough in the delivery of the network's catalytic mandate by enabling the provision of technical assistance in developing countries, growing and managing the network of Members, and advancing a critical pillar of the loss and damage architecture.

This event will provide an update on the Santiago network's progress and positioning within the broader loss and damage landscape and offer participants practical information on the development of demand-driven technical assistance requests.

Objectives of the event

The objectives of the event are to:

- Provide updates on the operationalization of the Santiago network and its positioning within the wider loss and damage landscape.
- Deep dive into the process for accessing technical assistance and offer practical information on the development of demand-driven technical assistance requests, with a view to increasing engagement with developing countries.
- Share views on the acceleration of technical assistance, its catalytic nature to build resilience and complementarity with related mechanisms and agendas.
